When the Youth Club lost funding from LCC this could have been the end of a vital resource for the young people of the area. The new trustees and committee came together to ensure this vital service was retained for the youngsters, giving their time and efforts free of charge so that the youngsters have a safe and pleasurable environment to meet.

Melvyn Landan joined the Deepings Mens Group in 1994 and became an assistant charity officer in 1995 and senior charity organiser in 1998. Since then, as well as issuing equipment he has been the main contact point for the DMG and has maintained all the stock records and looked after the site. Last year Steve Canham celebrated 25 years as a local Scouting leader currently: Explorer Leader, County Staged Events Advisor and Network Group Leader. Deena Burkitt has organised the Thursday Age Concern lunch for older residents for many years as well as coffee mornings to

raise funds. Simon Marshall has the voluntary role of Treasurer at The Priory Church and in the last couple of years Simon has also written a large number of funding bids in order to seek funding for the refurbishment of the church / community hall. Without Simon's dedication in finding funding the Hall – which is used by many community groups - it would have faced closure. As soon as it became public that DSJ would lose the DSJ Signal Box, Stuart Hall immediately started a campaign to save it and with a group of dedicated volunteers, he saved the box. It is now in the process of being reconstructed on a site near to its original home. Carole Bremner has worked so hard over the last year or so to gather funds for the Friends of Jubilee Park's plan to install a Trim Trail for the free use of residents of all ages. As a result of her extremely time-consuming and energy-sapping input in obtaining over £10000, the Trim Trail was installed in February, much sooner than anticipated. Nora & Brian Littler are part of a group of volunteers who



work at The Lakes spending a great deal of their time there. In addition they have been involved in other environmental projects within the community, sharing their knowledge and enthusiasm. Following a successful campaign, Liz Waterland was the first Chairman of the Friends of Deepings Library and was instrumental in gathering together a large number of volunteers to enable the Library to become the success it is today. The Deepings Community Centre is organised by a Board of Trustees, led by Liz Nobel and Sue Harris, together they have spearheaded a transformation at the Centre recently changing its appearance with a new colour scheme, flooring and many other improvements. Revd. Sonia Marshall is the dedicated curate at The Priory Church. In the last year she has coped with another interregnum period at the church and remains a constant support to her congregation. Brenda Hurl (not pictured) organises the Visiting & Befriending service for Age Concern.
