Make a change, become a local councillor

Deeping St James Parish Council is calling on residents, passionate about their community to stand in the local elections which will be held on Thursday 2 May 2019.

What do councillors do?

Councillors are the champions of their community and give residents a voice on the decisions the council makes. Becoming a councillor will allow you to make a real difference in your community by engaging with residents, local groups and businesses to find out their needs; making decisions on which services and projects the council should take forward; and getting involved locally to ensure the services are meeting your community's needs.

How long does it take?

The National Association of Local Councils (NALC) Local Councillor Census Survey found that councillors put aside, on average, three hours a week for council work. This often includes attending meetings, engaging with residents and speaking on behalf of the council to other bodies.

Can I stand?

There are only a few rules to stand for election. You must be:

- A British citizen, or a citizen of the
- Commonwealth, or the European Union
- 18 years of age or older

• Live in an area that is served by a local council

Making play safe

The play equipment and the play areas within the Parish are inspected each year to ensure all necessary maintenance work is carried out and the play equipment remains accessible.



This of course also includes the soft play surfaces which are found in various parts of the parks. After the last inspection it was decided to invest in replacing the soft play surfaces and some of the equipment which had been damaged by the constant mowing and strimming of the play areas. The play areas in Jubilee Park, Woody Heights and Hereward Way have now all been upgraded and will hopefully continue to provide safe places to play for many years to come.

Signal Box update

With winter fading and spring on the horizon, the world is waking to new growth and the work on rebuilding our Signal Box at St James Deeping is no exception. During the winter months our team has been busily preparing the land for work to begin in earnest. At the moment, tree trunks have been removed and a gravel pathway lain to make access possible for large vehicles. We are now ready for Stamford College to mark out the footings and a company is ready to dig them. A large container has been moved onto the site and Anglian Water contacted to lay on water to the site thus providing facilities for the students whilst working on site and also the necessary supply for cement making. During the winter months the College has also been refurbishing the large road gates for us. WW1 Planter on the DSJ Green

Deeping St James Parish Council have had a Planter made to commemorate the end of WW1 with funds donated by the First World War Commemorative Committee and it is situated on the village green on Churchgate.

2019 is going to be a year of change in Deeping St James, apart from Brexit.

May is election time for the Parish Council as well as District Council, and I encourage you all to go out and vote. Also why not consider putting yourself forward for office? It can be interesting and very rewarding.



Delaine Buses are now running the 203 Service from Stamford through to Spalding, but no longer servicing Bridge Street and Broadgate Lane. The Shaws 100 Service has also ceased, thereby losing the bus service on Park Road Welland Way and Manor Way. We must ensure the new 203 service is a success, so that we do not lose it, whilst at the same time Parish Councillors are in discussions with Call Connect and Lincolnshire County Council to try and enhance this new service.

Friends of Jubilee Park have purchased gym equipment, which will be installed as a "Trim Trail" on the park.

I am sure you are all aware that Barclays Bank have announced they will be closing the last bank in the Deepings. Parish Councillors are fighting this closure, whilst also seeking a replacement Bank in the event that the closure happens.



Finally Deeping's Youth Group has a new Board of Trustees, and a new venue. The Youth Club opens on Thursday evenings at the Scout Hut on Lancaster Way in Market Deeping, whilst continuing with Friday evenings at The Cross School, Eastgate, Deeping St James. The Trustees including 4 DSJ Parish Councillors are working hard to resurrect this valuable service for young people, and it would be nice to see new faces.

All this change can be good if managed correctly, but can only be achieved if we all work together.

Deepings Neighbourhood Plan – update

A project initiated in 2016 by Market Deeping Town and Deeping St James Parish Councils, with the support of community volunteers. Its purpose is to help make the Deepings a better place to live, work and enjoy life.

The team of volunteers have been busy collecting data (you may recall a survey from 2017), trawling through information, carrying out character assessment walks, speaking to developers and experts. A lot of information has been gathered, studied, assessed and discussed. Most chapters of the plan are now well under way and we have a view of the issues and opportunities ahead. We would like to do some further testing of the conclusions arrived at so far and thus we will soon be asking for the local community to participate in a set of surveys.

Although a lot of the focus is on housing the plan will also consider aspects such as Leisure, Health & Wellbeing, Transport, Heritage, the Local Economy & Employment.

If you can spare a little time to complete one or more of these questionnaires it would be greatly appreciated, and it gives you the opportunity to have your input to the future of the Deepings. We are launching the surveys mid to late February and that will take us close to the end of producing the documented plan. Following that, there are many statutory hurdles to cross before it becomes binding and most of those have lengthy fixed time periods, thus to be realistic, we are aiming for an approved plan around spring of 2020.

SPALDING BUS SERVICE CHANGES

The Deeping - Spalding bus service changed from 2nd January. The Shaws 100 bus has been withdrawn and replaced by Delaine 203 which has extended to Spalding. The 203 runs direct along Horsegate and Spalding Road, not serving Church Street or Broadgate Lane.

Lincolnshire County Council cannot afford to continue subsidising the 100 service, so Delaines have kindly stepped in to provide a Spalding service on a commercial basis. It may not be as comprehensive as some would wish, but it's better than no service at all.

Please support the new service by using it whenever you can, and leave the car at home!

Illegal encampments? What to do ...



Dealing with unwelcome visitors is never easy – but what do you do if you wake up to a travellers encampment on your land...?

Following numerous incidents in the Deepings over recent months, your Parish Council has set up a working group with Market Deeping Town Council as well as district and county councillors so we can be best prepared to effectively and quickly resolve any future similar problems.

The group has identified possible sites in the Deepings and is drafting advice to local farmers and other landowners on ways to legally deal with unwanted encampments – and hopefully prevent them occurring in the first place!

Meantime, the Country Landowners Association offer the following tips:

Make your land as secure as possible using ditches, boulders, fences and gates – but do not erect anything that could cause injury or obstruct public rights of way

Make sure you can contact your solicitor - including out of hours.

Photograph any unwanted encampment on your land to show numbers of vehicles, caravans, people, and any damage – but be careful not to intimidate and be mindful of your obligations under the 2018 General Data Protection Regulations (GDPR). Consider insuring yourself for legal costs – do check exactly what's covered in the policy.

If you need to take legal action, you must prove ownership and legal rights to your land. To prevent delays, keep an up to date plan of your land handy and copies of deeds or land registry documents, as well as any tenancy and grazing agreements. Phi/Dilks
