On the buses

At the start of the pandemic, bus services in the village were cut back because very few people were using them. Gradually they were restored as people started travelling again, but the morning peak-time bus into Peterborough was not reinstated.

I'm pleased to report that, from 2nd January, Delaine Buses will run an extra service 102 bus from Towngate East at 07.33 (Mondays to Fridays). This will follow the usual route via Burchnall Close,



Thackers Way and Horsegate as far as Market Deeping, where passengers can change onto the 101 service from Church Street (Red Cross shop) at 07.50, arriving in Peterborough 08.17.

Even though this new service requires a change of bus in Market Deeping, it will help our residents to get to work in Peterborough once again. We would like to thank Delaines for putting on this new bus, and we urge people to use it.

Just a reminder that the 301 service between Spalding and Stamford now runs every hour during daytimes, Mondays to Fridays. This is particularly useful for residents in the Broadgate Lane, Spalding Road and Frognall areas, who now have a viable alternative to the car. Tim Stevens, Transport Advisor

Welland Footbridge

The Parish Council originally became involved with this project via the Northern Footpaths Forum, whose aim is to build a link between Peakirk and Eastgate, by providing a bridge, adjacent to the Rail bridge at Sandy Bank.

This is a complex project, and has been running for a number of years. However, two Parish Councillors have recently picked up the challenge again, and are



now working with Peakirk and Northborough Parish Councils and the Northern Footpaths Forum. This Parish Council is currently working with a Civil Engineering firm to agree work that will satisfy the planning permission.

The budget for the project is large and a great deal of work relating to fund raising will be needed. This in itself provides a challenge as these are difficult times as funding streams are much more limited – both in size and criteria. Once we have the project back on track we will keep parishioners advised of the next steps and any help which might be needed.

Signal Box update

Having secured an initial Heritage Lottery Fund grant the Group is now able to put itself on a more professional footing, which will lead to applying for a larger grant to secure the build.

To this end Susanna Antoun has been employed as Project Facilitator. Susanna comes with a wealth of experience projects such as this and having recently moved in to the area is keen to become



involved in the community. The committee has gained new members and the Group now has three elements; 1) Rebuild Evaluation 2) Community Engagement 3) Charity Development. Each has a distinctive role in moving the project forward.

The group are now in a position to employ a Heritage Construction specialist who will advise on all aspects of rebuilding the Box.

Looking after our trees

Last year the Council procured a specialist arboriculturalist contractor to carry out a survey of all the trees owned by the parish council.

The survey provided useful information on the trees the council are responsible for so informed decisions can be made to decide which trees are in need of maintenance work to keep the tree healthy or to prevent a tree becoming a health and safety hazard and which trees need to be removed. This survey has helped us to budget for any work needed.

The survey contains information such as:

- Species of the tree based on scientific name.
- Physical measurements of the tree such as height and diameter.
- Age of the tree.
- Overall health of the tree.
- Life expectancy.
- Management recommendations.

As a result works are planned on some of the trees in the early part of this year. Clbr Diane Rose

The Parish Council in line with other Councils across the country has to consider how much money will be needed to maintain existing services and also to finance any other planned projects. When agreed this amount is charged as part of the Council Tax to homes throughout the village and is known as the precept. This is the time of year when the exercise is completed up and down the country.

Some of the services that Deeping St James Parish Council are responsible for include:

- Providing and maintaining allotments
- Maintaining Woody Heights Skate Park and various other play equipment
- · Grass Cutting, tree maintenance and litter picking
- Maintaining the Cemetery, and acting as a Burial Authority
- Providing a summer play scheme for young people.
- · Providing funding for the Community Library and Youth Group along with other organisations
- Providing and maintaining bus shelters, benches, waste bins, noticeboards, signage and flower containers

Overall the aim is to provide value for money, for Council Tax payers, whilst maintaining services.

Deeping St James Parish Council is at the bottom tier of local government, but it is no less important than the other tiers. The closer government is to the people, the more accessible and representative it is. Also services provided tend to be more focused and better value for money. Parish Councillors receive no remuneration, but give their time freely to make a difference to their communities.

However, the Parish Clerk has to deal with a number of queries from the public about services that the Parish Council is not responsible for, which has a domino effect on her work schedule.

Your pothole stories wanted to help fix our roads



Your county council is fighting for more Government money to help fix our local roads - and they need your help!

If you've been affected by broken roads or a plague of potholes, your voice is needed in a new campaign for fairer funding.

The 'Fix Our Funds To Fix Our Roads' drive has been launched following last year's 25 per cent cut in the Government's road maintenance grant to Lincolnshire County Council - down from £51m to £38.7m.

As a result, the council allocated £12.3m from its reserves to cover the current financial year.

But now the council is warning that unless the missing £12.3 million is restored in the coming year's grant, 24,000 potholes could go unfilled and 37 miles of roads in need of rebuilding may be left un-repaired.

Council Leader Cllr Martin Hill has acknowledged that potholes were the top issue raised by residents in last year's local elections in Deeping and across the county.

Last month's council meeting saw cross-party support to lobby Government for a fairer grant in the coming year.

Cllr Richard Davies, LCC's executive member for highways said: "Lincolnshire people who have to use crumbling roads on a daily basis are being punished by this underfunding from the Department for Transport, so we need every resident who's had enough to help us with our new 'Fix Our Funds To Fix Our Roads' funding campaign.

"When the Government brings in over £25 billion a year from fuel duty alone, it's hard to understand why we've had to use money from our reserves to fill the £12 million left by roads maintenance grant cuts.

"It's crucial that we get this money back because, without it, people will see our roads get worse."
